

Youth Protection Training- Scouting Safe Program for our Youth

Youth protection is the most important program for our youth that the BSA has developed and is mandatory to be a Scouting leader no matter the registered position. Leadership commitment to the established BSA Youth Protection Program is essential in keeping youth safe and a part of a successful life changing program. Youth protection only works when EVERYONE in Scouting has been trained in the Youth Protection Program and then holds every peer accountable when delivering the program. MyScouting.org is an online resource to take online Youth Protection training. The Council also supplies Youth Protection DVD's to units for free and has computers at the Scout Service Center for use in taking the online training. Please make an appointment if you need these resources.

Leadership selection: chartered organizations must interview potential leaders, check references, and have the unit committee review the application as well to ensure only the best people are being selected, people who will follow the procedures and be FULLY TRAINED as leaders.

Create barriers to child abuse: leaders and unit committee members, as well as Council and district staff and volunteers, create barriers to abuse by enforcing the youth protection policies.

Reporting improper behavior is the next step in identifying offenders and removing them from the program and having the authorities investigate. Youth can be trained in how to report and respond to perpetrators through the Cub Scout video "A Time to Tell" and the Boy Scout and Venturing "It Happened to Me" videos. Go to Scouting.org for more information on these resources.

All incidences need to be reported to the Scout Service Center immediately so offenders can be reported to authorities and removed from Scouting. Again, shared involvement at all levels of our Scouting program will best achieve our number one mission, keeping youth safe.

In 2014, less than 30% of the BSA councils in the USA had any membership growth. As a result, a task force was convened to review best methods of the Councils that did and the environment we are currently in. In the Moraine Trails Council, we had membership growth in 2011 and 2012 followed by two years of decline. Some of the decline has been due to access issues in some school districts and some increased competition for family time, regardless of the reasons it is time for a new approach. At the June 4th Program Kick-off at the Preston Center, Camp Bucoco, the new Sign up Night Program will be presented. In addition, there will be booths promoting 2016 programs and a leader session with tips on program planning for packs, troops, and crews. Booths will open at 6:30pm and sessions begin at 7:00pm with time to see booths in between sessions and after. 10 Steps Toward A Safer Summer

Every kid loves summer, but all that freedom can mean potential danger. That's why the BSA and the National Center for Missing and Exploited Children have partnered to help keep your kids safe.

By following these 10 safety tips, you'll help in this important effort.

Make sure children know their full name, address, telephone numbers and how to use the telephone. Be sure children know what to do in case of an emergency and how to reach you using a cellphone. Children should have a neighbor or trusted adult they may call if they're scared or there's an emergency.

Review the rules with your children about whose homes they may visit and discuss the boundaries of where they may and may not go in the neighborhood.

Make sure children know to stay away from pools, creeks or any body of water without adult supervision.

Caution children to keep the door locked and not to open the door or talk to anyone who comes to the door when they are home alone.

Don't drop your children off at malls, movies, video arcades or parks. These are not safe places for children to be alone. Make certain a responsible adult supervises your younger children at all times when they are outside and away from home.

Teach your children in whose vehicle they may ride. Children should be cautioned to never approach any vehicle, occupied or not, unless accompanied by a parent or other trusted adult.

Be sure your children know their curfew and check in with you if they are going to be late. If children are playing outside after dark, make sure they wear reflective clothing and stay close to home.

Choose babysitters with care. Obtain references from family, friends and neighbors. Many states now have registries for public access to check criminal history or sex-offender status. Observe the babysitter's interaction with your children, and ask your children how they feel about the babysitter.

Check out summer programs before enrolling your children. Make sure there will be adult supervision of your children at all times, and make sure you are made aware of all activities and field trips offered by the camp or program. Fortunately, in Scouting all registered adults must complete Youth Protection training.





The Wade Snider Scouting Scholarship Criteria

- 1. First preference is an individual who has earned the Boy Scout Eagle, Girl Scout Gold, or Venture Scout Silver Award. Applicant must provide proof of award.
- 2. Second preference is a Butler County High School Graduate
- 3. Third preference is an individual active in Scouting for five or more years. Applicant must provide proof of Scout membership.
- 4. Applicant must be enrolled full-time (12+ credits)
- 5. Applicant must have a 2.5 minimum GPA



Attention Volunteers: The new "Be A Scout" Campaign has launched and the new Map feature is now Live on the National BSA site. This means that Youth and Parents IN YOUR AREA will be using this Map feature to find Scout Units.

Here's what you need to do - the whole process should take less than 10 minutes:

Step 1. Log onto your account at "MyScouting.org" and select "BeAScout" from the Unit Tools section on the left-hand Menu. A new page will be displayed: There are two "tabs" on this Window, and you should be on "Unit Pin Management" - if not, then click the "Unit Pin Management" tab.

- Step 2. Take a moment to look-over the Unit Pin Management screen: If at any time you are lost, look for the "Help" link in the upper right-hand corner of the page for help. Also, note that the "Google Pin Preview" section, in the bottom-right area of the page, will display what will appear on the Google Map. It will change as you enter/edit information in these steps.
- Step 3. Check the "Unit Description" this box contains a combination of your unit name & your chartered organization. If that the information is incorrect then reach out to your District Executive (DE) for assistance.

Step 4: if your Scout Unit has a web site, then enter the web address (URL) here. Otherwise, enter http://www.morainetrails.org so they will be directed to the Moraine Trails web site. You can always edit this field later if your Unit establishes a website.

- Step 5. update the Alternate Unit Description: many Units opt to type their Unit type & number followed by their Meeting location (example: "Pack 867 Lincoln Elementary")
- Step 6: make sure the Pin Status says "Active" if you want your Pin visible to perspective Scouts and Parents on the Google Map.
- Step 7a: select your Primary Contact. This person will receive all emails from prospective Scout parents, so be sure to let the person know that they will be responding to all parent leads. If the fields in this section are "grey" then you must check the "Contact Person" box in the "Fields Displayed on Google Pin" section at the bottom-left side of the page. If the person is already a Registered Adult Leader in your Scout Unit, then their name will be selectable from a list. Once selected, all information is automatically provided in this section's fields.

• Step 7b: Also be sure to check all the information with the Primary Contact Volunteer & edit fields that are no longer current (Example: a phone number or email address changes). It is very important that you keep this information up-to-date as Volunteers & contact information will change over time.

That's all you need to do to set up your unit for BeAScout.org. Be sure to do this as soon as possible so your unit will get recruiting leads.

- Step 8. Enter the location where your unit holds its meetings (address information). This address will dictate where your unit pin will appear on Google Maps. Note that it may be helpful to enter the name of your Meeting Location "Address 1" and the street address on "address 2"
- Step 9. Check the Google PIN Preview this is a preview of what will appear on the map. Parents will only be able to see what is in this box, so please Review it carefully for accuracy.
- **NOTE**: There is an option to change the icon from a Scouting map symbol representing your unit type to something else. **Please DO NOT change the unit logo icon.**
- Step 10. Once you are done, click the "SAVE" button and your information will be uploaded.

Where may an Eagle Scout (youth or adult) wear his Eagle Palms?

Until recently there were only two ways that Eagle Palms could be displayed – on the ribbon of the Eagle medal and, for adults, on the Eagle square knot. A third option has now been approved. As of Jan. 1, 2014, youth may also wear Eagle Palms on the Eagle Scout rank emblem (patch) which is sewn on the field uniforms.



Perfecting Attendance

Three awards recognize tenure in Scouting.

You can identify veteran Scouts and Scouters by their well-worn uniforms, their beyond-broken-in-hiking boots, and the patches on their shirts and brag vests. But the BSA also offers awards that take the guesswork out of figuring out just how long someone has been around. Service stars, attendance pins and veteran pins are three ways you show off your tenure in Scouting. Here's an introduction.

What are Service Stars?

Small pins that indicate how many years of tenure a Scout or Scouter has in the BSA. Each star is worn on a circular backing show color indicates which phase of Scouting it represents.

What do the colors indicate?

Four colors represent youth service: gold for Cub Scouting (including Webelos Scouts), green for Boy Scouting, brown for Varsity Scouting and red for Venturing and Sea Scouts. Adult service is shown with a blue backing. Adults may combine their youth and adult tenure and just wear stars with blue backing.

How do the stars show the number of years of service?

Each star displays a number. The youth or adult member combines stars to show his or her years of service. For example, a boy was Cub Scout for four years and a Boy Scout for six years would wear a four-year service star on a gold backing and a six-year service star on a green backing. An adult with 27 years of service would wear two stars on blue backings for a 20-year service star and a seven-year service star.

What service stars are available?

Stars are available in one-year increments form one to 10. After that they go in five-or 10-year increments up to 90. Pins and backing may be purchase at local Scout shops.

Where service are stars worn?

Above the left pocket of the uniform shirt. If a medal or an embroidered knot is worn, service stars are worn a quarter of an inch above the medal or knot.

Who is eligible to war service stars?

Any youth or adult member with at least one year of tenure.

Must a person's' tenure be continuous?

No. Someone who was a Scout as a youth and returned years later as an adult could wear stars representing both periods of tenure.

What are attendance pins?

Attendance pins are worn by youth members in all programs to reward regular attendance.

Who decides what regular attendance means?

The unit leader.

How do attendance pins indicate years of attendance?

Each pin includes a bar that shows the number of years. Pins are available in one-year increments from one to 10 years. Pins may be purchases at local Scout shops.

Where are attendance pins worn?

Above the left pocket of the uniform shirt.

What is the veteran award?

The Veteran Award recognizes adults for their tenure in Scouting. (Note, however, that tenure earned as youth member may be included.) Veterans agree to live up to their Scouting obligations, make themselves available for service and be active in promoting Scouting as circumstances permit. They must also be currently registered in the BAA. Veteran receive a veteran pin, which if for non-uniform wear.
