Youth Protection Training- Scouting Safe Program for our Youth

Youth protection is the most important program for our youth that the BSA has developed and is mandatory to be a Scouting leader no matter the registered position. Leadership commitment to the established BSA Youth Protection Program is essential in keeping youth safe and a part of a successful life changing program. Youth protection only works when EVERYONE in Scouting has been trained in the Youth Protection Program and then holds every peer accountable when delivering the program. MyScouting.org is an online resource to take online Youth Protection training. The Council also supplies Youth Protection DVD's to units for free and has computers at the Scout Service Center for use in taking the online training. Please make an appointment if you need these resources.

Leadership selection: chartered organizations must interview potential leaders, check references, and have the unit committee review the application as well to ensure only the best people are being selected, people who will follow the procedures and be FULLY TRAINED as leaders.

Create barriers to child abuse: leaders and unit committee members, as well as Council and district staff and volunteers, create barriers to abuse by enforcing the youth protection policies.

Reporting improper behavior is the next step in identifying offenders and removing them from the program and having the authorities investigate. Youth can be trained in how to report and respond to perpetrators through the Cub Scout video "A Time to Tell" and the Boy Scout and Venturing "It Happened to Me" videos. Go to Scouting.org for more information on these resources.

All incidences need to be reported to the Scout Service Center immediately so offenders can be reported to authorities and removed from Scouting. Again, shared involvement at all levels of our Scouting program will best achieve our number one mission, keeping youth safe.

Propelling the New Cub Scout Program

Membership Campaign at the June 4th Program Launch

With Cub Scout membership down nationwide for several years, the National BSA has recently developed and produced a new Cub Scout program. The new program is more active, has more resources in one location, and has a leader book to accompany the handbooks the Cub Scouts will be using. An all new Council Fall Membership Campaign, with new incentives, will also be launched at the June 4th Program Launch at 6:30PM at the Preston Center, Camp Bucoco. *To qualify for the new program incentives, a unit must attend the kick-off in June or the alternate in August.* Membership Campaign orientation begins at 7:30PM.

In addition to the new Membership Campaign, there will be booths promoting the council programs from September 2015 through the summer of 2016, such as the Technology Academy, Council Camporee, and Fall Family Camp, to name a few. There will also be sessions to help leaders with program planning that will begin at 7PM sharp. Last, but not least, position required training will be promoted and *key popcorn sale information including the new product line will be distributed.* Each unit attending will receive a Council packet including a DVD with information from each booth and a Council calendar.

An Opportunity to Leave a Lasting Legacy to Scouting

The Moraine Trails Council, BSA is one of the smallest Councils in America, but one of the top councils in the country who are not financially in the red. This has been partially accomplished through development of the endowment fund. The endowment fund investments live in perpetuity while just 4.5% of the interest the fund produces is used to help maintain operations annually, along with Council fundraisers. Development of the fund through annual donations to it allows the fund to keep up with inflation and grow the principal. The James E. West Recognition is a special recognition for a \$1,000 or more contribution to the endowment fund. A special knot can be worn on the uniform for James E. West members. PA Act 153 Criminal Background Check Compliance Plan


Make plans to come visit Camp Bucoco on OA Night!

Eagle Scouts: Beyond the Merit Badge

One hundred years after Arthur Eldred of New York earned this nation's first Eagle Scout Award, new, independent research demonstrates the significant, positive impact Eagle Scouts have on society every day. Since it was first awarded in 1912, more than 2 million young men have achieved the Boy Scouts of America's highest rank. The study conducted by Baylor University, Merit Beyond the Badges, found that Eagle Scouts are more likely than men who have never been in Scouting to:

- Have higher levels of planning and preparation skills, be goal-oriented, and network with others
- Be in a leadership position at their place of employment or local community
- Report having closer relationships with family and friends
- Volunteer for religious and nonreligious organizations

Where may an Eagle Scout (youth or adult) wear his Eagle Palms?

Until recently there were only two ways that Eagle Palms could be displayed – on the ribbon of the Eagle medal and, for adults, on the Eagle square knot. A third option has now been approved. As of Jan. 1, 2014, youth may also wear Eagle Palms on the Eagle Scout rank emblem (patch) which is sewn on the field uniforms.
